The Hindmarsh River catchments area is between Mt Cone and Spring Mount.

This feeds the Hindmarsh River, which flows over the Hindmarsh falls down through Victor Harbor and out to sea just past Bridge Terrace. The falls are about 20 meters high.

View of the Hindmarsh River Mouth and Estuary area boardwalk can be accessed at the end of Bridge Terrace in Victor Harbor.

Hindmarsh Falls are located approximately 18 km from Victor Harbor (on the Myponga Rd).

Access can be found off Hindmarsh Tiers Road.

The picturesque Hindmarsh Falls are best viewed in Winter and Spring and after heavy rainfall.



HOW TO GET THERE

To get to the falls from Victor Harbor, take the Victor Harbor to Adelaide Road, travel 8km from the Victor Harbor town centre and turn left onto Hindmarsh Valley Road (Myponga turn off), then travel a further 9km and you will come to the turn off on the left to the falls.

You then travel 1km along a dirt road until you reach the picnic area. You can park here and walk on the concrete path to view the falls which is approximately 600 metres from the picnic area. There is another parking area 300 metres up the road from the picnic area which can accommodate around three cars, access to the falls is then via a cement walkway and a series of steps, which descend a further 300 metres to the falls viewing area.

- Not recommended for wheelchair access, walking frames or people who have difficulty in walking.
- The facilities at the picnic area include 3 wooden tables with bench style seating.
- There is no undercover area or toilets.
- Camping and bonfires are not permitted only gas BBQ.

HINDMARSH FALLS PICNIC AREA

The picnic area is grassed and the Hindmarsh River meanders through with plenty of shady trees along the banks.



The open string bark forest with closed scrubland understory is a popular area for birdwatching and species such as:

- Scrub Wren
- Bassian Thrush
- White Browed Scrubwren
- Eastern Spinebill
- White Throated Treecreeper
- Laughing Kookaburra



Some trails venture deeper into the valley and follow the river's edge.

Naturally the falls are at their best in Winter and after heavy rainfalls in the area.
